SPRING HAS SPRUNG



RABBI'S REPORT

Dear Friends:

Sunday evening, April 15, marked the beginning of this year's observance of Yom Ha-Shoa (Holocaust Remembrance Day) in Israel and in our community. On a night when many of us would have considered the weather "miserable," more than a hundred people came out to take part in this important interfaith commemoration and call to action. Once again, my amazing colleagues in the Christian community and a number of wonderful representatives of Plymouth's "No Place for Hate" Committee led us in a meaningful, unifying program.

One of our new readings came from Vicki Fitzgerald, one of CBJ's own members. The Rev. Gary Marks, who presented this reading, was clearly moved by it. Some of our members who heard Vicki's message suggested to me that I might want to offer it to readers of The Tent. With Vicki's permission, I do so now.

Reflections on Yom Ha-Shoa By Vicki Fitzgerald

I shall begin with something personal, then move on to the more general. First, a confession: I've never been really comfortable with Yom Hashoah observances. I lost a lot of family in what we now call the Holocaust; and I used to think that, for me, the appropriate way to mark the day was to go into my room, shut the door behind me and remember and remember and meditate - until I wept: My private sorrow.

As time went on, conversations with Rabbi Silverman and other friends convinced me that I ought to attend the Yom Hashoah service. Important, impressive and beautiful as these observances have been, I remain not completely comfortable. What's my problem?, you ask.

My problem with this annual event is: It's not enough. It stops far too short of making

an action item out of NEVER AGAIN which, I take it, is the fervent wish, prayer and determination of all of us. Remembering is essential, but without translating NEVER AGAIN into meaningful action, we risk allowing ceremonial remembrance to slide into sentimentality. We have heard a clarion call to action. People of faith and human values have been given a job to do: What Jewish tradition calls "Tikkun Olam" -- the healing of the world.

NEVER AGAIN means never again genocide against anybody anywhere. Yet genocide continues all over the globe; and it would seem most world citizens again feel powerless to take action. There were Rwanda and Bosnia in the Nineties. Today there's Darfur, and it's only the worst of several ongoing horrors in Africa and Asia.

I suggest the first action we all can take is to inform ourselves. You'll find as much material much material as you can handle in newspapers, periodicals and on the internet. Google the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, and you'll find a couple of hours' worth of very specific information and excellent links. Besides being a top information source, the Museum is a leading force in an anti-genocide movement that is perhaps finally taking shape; and there are ways that we ourselves can become part of this movement and this effort. This³ is one job we'll really have to keep doing until we



JEWISH HISTORY PROJECT

HARRY FRIM

One of the most colorful characters of 20th-century Plymouth was Harry Frim, a peddler and junk man remembered for his horse-drawn wagon. Frim appears in many Plymoutheans' recollections of growing up in town. If anyone has a story, more information, or a photo of Harry Frim, please contact the author.

Frim's first appear in Plymouth in Plymouth records around 1911, when Abraham, a junk peddler, and son (?) Jacob are listed as living on Union Street near the waterfront. Several other Jewish families lived on Union, Bradford and Sandwich streets. Morris Frim, who also lived on Union Street, is listed in the town directory as a laborer in 1921. Harry Frim was born in Poland c1895, and came to America around 1910. He married Rebecca Stearns, also from Poland, in 1919. They had one son, Harris, also known as Hershey, born in 1921. That year Harry is listed as a junk peddler, living at 2 Pleasant Street. Older residents of Plymouth recall that he kept his horse at the west end of Summer Street, in a stable on what used to be called Vacant Lane.

Frim cruised the streets of Plymouth in his horse-drawn wagon, calling "Ju-nk." Plymoutheans of all backgrounds describe trading with him for their old bottles, rags and scrap metal. He had an old spring scale to weigh rags. Writer Maggie Mills remembered him coaxing his wagon up narrow, steep Spring Street to gather junk from houses on High Street in the 1920s. She always admired his horse, and one day he made her very happy by setting her upon the horse's neck.

Richmond Talbot recalled Frim dealing with his father, Richmond Sr., for his junk, some time in the 1940s. In haggling over price, Frim appealed to Talbot—"Do you want my children to starve?" Young Richmond entered the conversation in tears and begged his father not to let the children starve! While Frim liked kids, some of the neighborhood children were afraid of him. Harry and Richmond were always friendly after that, and Harry let him feed apples to his horse.


Harry was known for his size and prodigious strength. Nonagenarian Joe Busi recalled that Frim could down a bottle of ginger ale in a single gulp. On one occasion he was called to remove an old cast-iron stove from a house. When the men who had agreed to help him delayed coming upstairs, Frim loaded the stove—which must have weighed 600 pounds—on his back and carried it down the stairs single-handedly.

Many people recall that he could lift his horse. One hot summer day in the late 1940s veterinarian Ray Russo was driving on Pleasant Street near the synagogue. At the bottom of the hill was Harry's wagon, with the horse down on the ground. Ray pulled over to offer his assistance. He remembers Harry roaring and swearing at the horse to get up, when in disgust, Frim put his shoulders under the horse and strained until it was standing on all four feet. He said a few more words to the horse, and the two left.

Frim died in the 1950s and his son moved away from Plymouth. Although there are no longer Frims in town, anyone who grew up in Plymouth in the 1950s and before remembers this colorful character, part of our local history and lore.



In the torah, the festival is called "Hag HaShavuot," the Festival of Weeks. As cited in Deuteronomy, 16:9-10, Shavuot is celebrated seven weeks after Passover. It celebrates the day the Ten Commandments were revealed to Moses on Mount Sinai.

Decorating with Flowers and Plants

Shavuot's significance as an agricultural festival is seen by bringing the outdoors in. Homes and synagogues are decorated with a variety of plants, flowers and greenery. Tradition says that the reason for decorating with plants and flowers is that when the Torah was given at Mount Sinai, the barren desert bloomed with flowers as the earth itself rejoiced.

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



PREHEAT OVEN TO 350. BUTTER A 1 1/2 QUART CASSEROLE DISH AND SET ASIDE. LAY BLINTZES ON A COOKIE SHEET AND BROWN IN OVEN, FLIPPING HALF WAY THROUGH, SHOULD TAKE ABOUT 8-10 MINUTES. CAN DO THIS ON THE STOVE IN A PAN AS WELL.
LAY BROWNED BLINTZES IN PREPARED CASSEROLE.

MIX TOGETHER EGGS, SOUR CREAM, VANILLA, ORANGE JUICE, SALT AND SUGAR. POUR OVER BLINTZES.

BAKE IN PREHEATED OVEN FOR 1 HOUR. BE CAREFUL, CRUST BURNS FAST IF OVERCOOKED. SOUFFLÉ WILL PUFF AND BE GOLDEN BROWN WHEN FINISHED.

SERVE WITH CANNED FRUIT AND SOUR CREAM ON SIDE.

SERVES 6 (2 BLINTZES PER PERSON)



- 6 cups zucchini, sliced very thin
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 tablespoons flour

- 2 cups grated cheddar cheese
- Bread crumbs, about 1/2 cup

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sauté zucchini in butter, just slightly, until a little soft. Set aside. In a bowl, mix 2 egg yolks with sour cream and flour. Set aside. In the bowl of a mixer, or by hand, whip 2 egg whites until stiff peaks. Fold whites into yolk mixture.

In a buttered 9x13 pan layer 1/2 squash, 1/2 egg mixture, 1/2 cheese. Repeat layers and top with bread crumbs.

Bake for 25 minutes. Serve immediately
