A MESSAGE FROM RABBI SILVERMAN

Here's a change of pace for this column: some food for thought and perhaps a stimulus for action.

“Why should I join the Synagogue?” someone might say. “After all, I'm a good person. I follow the rules of society; I try to contribute to society as well. Why do I need organized religion?”

Answer: The high code of ethics by which you have committed yourself to be guided is itself a heritage from the teachings of the Synagogue. If this code of ethics has proved to be such an important force in your life, it is worthy of being kept alive and carried forward into the next generation even as it was brought forward into your generation and mine. You can also contribute your own insights and experience to the making of a better future for your family and your community. Very few people are totally without religion, even among those who call themselves “non-religious.” There are obviously differences in how many people express their religious commitment. In the world there are individuals who use their religion to justify horrible acts; we hear about them all too often in the daily news. I believe that the true purpose of religion in general — and of Judaism in particular — is to call us to the highest ethical standard. Religion in its essence exists to lead us along moral pathways in our lives. The Jewish congregation, is, and has been, a source of inspiration and a sign of Jewish tradition and values. The Synagogue exists to teach us, to unify us, and to direct us to embody those values in our own lives. It is of no particular credit to the individual to claim, “I am a good person in my daily life” — that is what we *should* be in our daily lives.

Morality, which upholds and harmonizes human relationships; the basic laws of society; the code of ethics which guides all business relations; and medical ethics; these expressions of morality are all to be found in organized religion, in the centuries of teaching generated, preserved, and held up for us to understand and to practice.

FUNDRAISING NEWS

Greetings one and all,

My message is to thank those who support our gift card program and to make a plea to those who aren't yet a part of the CBJ Gift Card Program. Your regular participation is strongly urged. By doing so you will help to ensure the continued financial health of our Jewish community in the greater Plymouth area.

Since the high holy days we have added four new families. Additionally we are approaching the \$400,000 mark in gross revenues in the several years of the programs existence. We are indebted to the eighteen families who consistently support the program through their monthly orders. It is a fact that the current subscribers net contributions for the fiscal year ending June 30th equaled \$6,000. However we still have a deficit and the simplest way to shore that up is with your participation.

I ask myself why there are several regular customers who aren't members of CBJ. If these folks see the benefit to CBJ don't you think you should jump on the band wagon and support the program as well? This is truly a no brainer fundraiser and has no impact on your budget as the monies you'd be spending are funneled into this program and the direct benefit is reduction or elimination of the deficit. If half of the CBJ families that aren't in the program join and they purchase just \$100. a month in grocery store (Shaw's, Hannaford, Stop & Shop and The Market at Pine Hills) cards CBJ realizes an approximate profit of \$1800. You can do the math and see where \$200 or \$400 or greater participation from the congregation would take us.

In addition to those supermarkets we also carry in stock Whole Foods, L.L. Bean, Subway, CVS, Panera, Dunkin Donuts, Olive Garden, Sally Beauty Supply, WalMart, and Papa Gino's/D'Angelo's. Feel free to browse through the user friendly web site of our card supplier (www.glscrip.com) and get a feel for the scope of cards available. If you'd like us to inventory a specific card monthly just let us know. At this time DeMoula's/Market Basket, Costco, BJ's and Mary Lou's are not available. We even have provisions in place for monthly purchases and payment terms.

Each time you use these cards you are giving a gift to our beloved CBJ and that is why we call these gift cards. Please consider joining this most worthy cause and help support the financial stability of CBJ.

Notes on Yahrzeit observance:

Some customs associated with Yahrzeit observance are: lighting a memorial candle at home in the evening at the beginning of the Yahrzeit period; saying Kaddish during a Shabbat service close to the Yahrzeit; donating to a charity or one of CBJ's special funds in memory of the one whose Yahrzeit is being observed.

Members, Guests and Friends of CBJ:

I am happy to remind you of a program that we offer at Congregation Beth Jacob to inform fellow Jews: both members and their families and friends of CBJ, of the annual yahrzeit dates of their loved ones. Once you have supplied the names and dates (either Hebrew or English) of those whom you wish to remember, you will receive notification approximately three weeks in advance of the yahrzeit date. There is no charge for this service. We feel that it's important to supply this service to all interested Jews.

I realize that our members have furnished this information when they joined CBJ. We ask those of you who have not done so to supply this information again so we can be sure our records are up-to-date and accurate. This program is separate from your listings in our annual Yizkor Book of Remembrance.


HOSPITALITY FOR THE HOMELESS

In cooperation with the Plymouth Area Taskforce for the Homeless and the Plymouth Area Interfaith Clergy Association, CBJ will once again be supporting Nights of Hospitality for the Homeless, which begins at the end of October, and which will be located in one of the churches in our neighborhood. While we may not be able to use our Community Center as a Hospitality site this season, our participation is still very important; and our neighbors are counting on us. We are asking for voluntary contributions to support the program in three ways. 1) Chaperones (two per night); 2) Meal Providers (supper for the chaperones and 15-20 homeless individuals whom we refer to as our "guests" -- some subsidies may be available; and 3) Cash contributions, which help with all kind of expenses involved in the running of the program.
