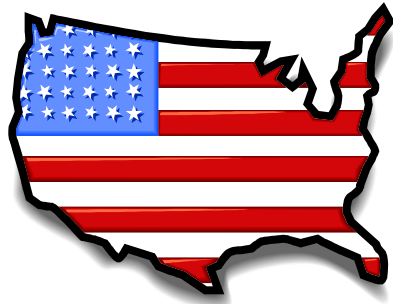

HAPPY INDEPENDENCE DAY

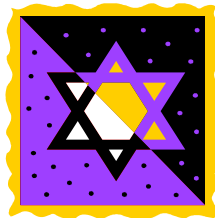

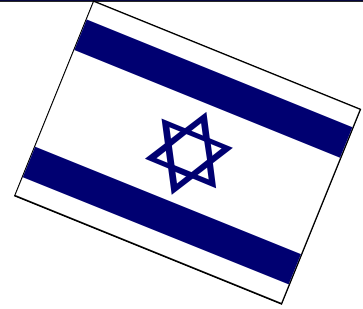

ADULT ED

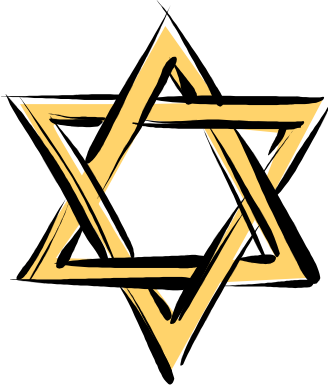
NOW HEAR THIS! LOTS OF GOOD THINGS are about to happen in Adult Ed when the new season begins.

WHAT ELSE would you like to learn through CBJ Adult Ed? To tailor our programs to your tastes we need your input. Look for a user-friendly preference questionnaire (also in the August mail) and on the web site.



*Do you have to believe in God to be a good Jew?
What is in the Jewish Bible?
What is the most important Jewish Holiday?
What one commandment supercedes all the rest?
What does Judaism teach about heaven and hell?
How and why has Judaism survived for so long?
What is ethical monotheism?
Does Judaism teach that Jesus was a prophet?
Why is it necessary to belong to a Jewish Community?
How can I learn more about Basic Judaism?*

A basic Judaism course will be presented in the fall to answer all of these questions and more. This course will be offered over three consecutive Saturday nights, with babysitting provided, so that everyone and anyone who wants to is able to attend...interfaith couples, Beit Sefer teachers, singles, parents, grandparents, teenagers, all seekers of knowledge about Judaism and the Jewish roots of Jesus. Our own Geveret Aharoni will be the instructor. She has recently taught this course based on "The Taste of Judaism" curriculum to The Second Church in Manomet and has been a facilitator for the Catholic-Jewish Dialogue of the South Shore. It is for members of CBJ, their families and friends. Attendance is free, but a reservation will be required.



What is the most important Jewish Holiday?
Did you say Passover? Chanukah? Yom Kippur? Nope! Think again.
If you said Shabbat, you are correct!
No other holiday is mentioned in the Ten Commandments. It is the fourth commandment. "Remember the Sabbath Day to Keep It Holy." How special is that? Shabbat is one of Judaism's great survival techniques. As much as we have kept the Shabbat, it has kept us!
And how lucky are we? It comes once a week!
So, that is 52 opportunities to celebrate Shabbat every year.
CBJ asks each family unit to help our congregation celebrate Shabbat at least once a year by sponsoring one Oneg Shabbat.

What is an Oneg Shabbat? It is the Joy of the Sabbath. A time to gather for noshing and socializing after Kabbalat Shabbat services on Friday evenings. You are asked to provide the refreshments, to set up before and clean up afterwards. And everyone loves you for doing it!

We have 120 family units. There are 52 Fridays. It is not rocket science to figure this should be easy to cover every Friday on the calendar.

There is nothing more disappointing than coming down to the vestry after services and seeing an empty table! And we have a Simcha Shabbat at the beginning of each month. Have a celebration you want to share? A birthday? Naming? Bar/Bat Mitzvah? Anniversary? New baby? Here is your opportunity.

SIMCHA BLESSINGS

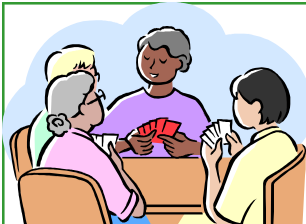

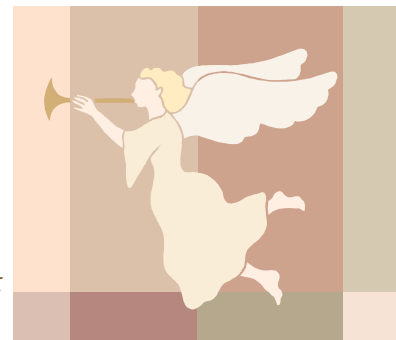
Volunteer opportunity
