Jesse Bluestein's Beautiful Tikkun Olam Bat Mitzvah Project! Your Support is Requested



Reform Congregations' Communal Observance of Tish B'av Saturday, August 6, 8:00 pm via Zoom

Tisha B'Av (the 9th day of the month of Av) is an annual fast day in Judaism, on which a number of disasters in Jewish history occurred, primarily the destruction of both Solomon's Temple by the Neo-Babylonian Empire in 586 BCE and the Second Temple by the Roman Empire in Jerusalem in 70 CE. It begins this year on the evening of August 6th. Traditional observance includes fasting, mourning, prayer, and abstaining from physical pleasures.

Recipe for Lemon Slice

This is a delicious and easy recipe for Lemon Slice from the July 13th issue of The Otago Daily Times on the South Island of New Zealand. Kiwis often refer to "cake" as "slice." This one has a base that is almost like shortbread, topped with tangy lemon custard and baked until it is perfectly set. Once it has chilled and set, slice it into squares and sprinkle with icing sugar to serve.

Makes 20 pieces Ready in 45 min + time for setting

INGREDIENTS FOR THE SHORTBREAD BASE

150g (5 1/2 oz) butter
1/4 cup caster sugar (granulated sugar)
2 tsp finely grated lemon zest
1/2 cups plain flour (I used gluten free flour)
1 tsp baking powder

LEMON TOPPING

4 eggs
3/4 cup caster sugar
4 tsp finely grated lemon zest (I didn't have quite enough, so I added 1 tsp vanilla extract)
1/4 cup plain flour 1 tsp baking powder
100ml (3 1/2 fl oz) lemon juice

TO SERVE

1 Tbsp icing sugar, to dust

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 170degC (325degF) fan bake.
2. Line a 27 x 17cm (10 1/2 x 6 1/2 inch) slice tin with baking paper. (I used 8x8 pan)
3. Melt the butter in a large glass bowl in the microwave. Add the sugar and lemon zest and whisk together.
4. Sift in the flour and baking powder, then mix until combined.
5. Transfer to the lined slice tin and press out evenly, smoothing the top with the back of a metal spoon.
6. Bake for 15 minutes until starting to brown. Allow to cool for 5 minutes before adding the topping.
7. To make the Lemon Topping, whisk together the eggs, sugar and lemon zest. Sift in the flour and baking powder, then add the lemon juice. Whisk together.
8. Pour the topping over the base and spread out evenly. Return it to the oven for a further 20 minutes, or until the topping does not jiggle.
9. Allow to cool to room temperature then chill until set before removing from the tin, then dusting with the icing sugar and cutting into pieces, five rows of four pieces will make 20.
10. Store in an airtight container in the fridge for up to three days.
