

While the development (and some presentation of the modern game) of golf serves as the backdrop for the story (hence the double entendre title), the historical information is fascinating, and the modern references thoroughly enjoyable. Recipe for Marinated Cucumber-Onion Salad



Ingredients:

- 5 cucumbers
- 1 red onion
- 1 cup apple cider vinegar (or white vinegar, red wine vinegar, rice vinegar)
- 1/2 cup sugar (or more to taste)
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon salt

Instructions:

- 1. Peel and slice cucumbers into thin slices. (A mandolin works well. Just be careful!)
- 2. Cut onion in half and cut into very thin slices.
- 3. Combine onions and cucumbers in a large bowl.
- 4. In a separate, medium-sized bowl, combine remaining ingredients. Stir until sugar dissolves.
- 5. Pour vinegar mixture over cucumbers and onions. Stir until the cucumbers are evenly coated in the dressing.
- 6. Refrigerate at least 20 minutes. Before serving, drain liquid and place in a serving bowl to serve.

Notes: You can store these vinegar marinated cucumbers in your refrigerator in a jar or air-tight container for up to three days. Any longer than that and the cucumbers will lose their "crisp-ness" and become limp.
