Hanukkah Begins on December 7th!

Hanukkah, one of the most widely observed Jewish holidays, is a festive eight-day celebration that for many people falls during the darkest, coldest season of the year. Also called the Festival of Lights, the holiday brings light, joy, and warmth to our homes and communities as we celebrate with candles, food, family, and friends. Light comes literally, with the lighting of an additional candle each day, and metaphorically, through a newer emphasis on charitable donations and a commitment to tikkun olam during the holiday. Hanukkah (alternately spelled Chanukah), meaning "dedication" in Hebrew, commemorates the victory of a small group of Jewish rebels (led by Judah Maccabee and his brothers, collectively known as "the Maccabees") over the armies of Syria in 165 B.C.E. and the subsequent liberation and "rededication" of the Temple in Jerusalem. Modern celebrations of Hanukkah focus on family and friends and include the lighting of the Hanukkah menorah (also called a hanukkiyah); singing and playing special songs and games (dreidel); and eating foods prepared in oil including latkes, sufganiyot, bimuelos (fried dough puffs) and keftes de prasas (leek patties).

Customs - Playing Dreidel

The word dreidel derives from a German word meaning "spinning top," and is the toy used in a Hanukkah game adapted from an old German gambling game. (Historically, Hanukkah was one of the few times of the year when rabbis permitted games of chance.) The four sides of the top bear four Hebrew letters: nun, gimel, hey, and shin. Players begin by putting into a central pot or "kitty" a certain number of coins, foil-wrapped chocolate disks known as gelt, nuts, buttons or other small objects. Each player in turn spins the dreidel and proceeds as follows:

נ nun – take nothing ג gimel – take everything ה hei – take half ש shin – put one in

Over time, the letters on the dreidel were reinterpreted to stand for the first letter of each word in the Hebrew statement, "Neis gadol hayah sham," which means "A great miracle happened there" and refers to the defeat of the Syrian army and the re-dedication of the Temple. In Israel, one letter on the dreidel differs from those used in the rest of the world. The shin has been replaced with a pey, transforming the Hebrew statement into "Neis gadol hayah po," which means "A great miracle happened here."



Overnights of Hospitality Winter Emergency Shelter

The Plymouth Area Interfaith Council Association (PAICA) needs your help!

Starting Sunday, November 26, The Plymouth Taskforce to End Homelessness, in collaboration with the Fr. Bill's and Mainspring (FBMS) organization, will offer winter emergency shelter to 20-25 single individuals through Saturday, March 30. We can't continue this important ministry without your help. We need volunteer chaperones to commit to giving one evening of their time from 5pm-11pm to provide support to the Fr. Bill's staff person and to show our unhoused neighbors that they are not forgotten. We who have volunteered in the past have been touched by the appreciation shown by many of the guests. It has been a very rewarding experience!

Two people are needed at the shelter at all times. There will be two Fr. Bill's staff from 11pm to 7am, so the volunteer chaperone is only needed for the evening until the second staff person arrives.

The shelter rotates weekly among three congregations beginning Sunday, November 26 through Saturday, March 30 - Christ Church, First Baptist Church and St Mary's and St Joseph Collaborative at St Mary's Parish Center, using the fellowship halls. Orientation is provided.

Recipe for Air Fryer Potato Latkes



These irresistibly-crispy air fryer potato pancakes can be ready in about 20 minutes! They're crunchy on the outside, soft on the inside, and a perfect complement for any meal.

PREP TIME 10 minutes COOK TIME 9 minutes TOTAL TIME 19 minutes

INGREDIENTS

2-3 green onions

6 potatoes, like Yukon Golds, peeled and quartered

Pinch of baking soda

2 eggs

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper or to taste

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

2 tablespoons flour

Olive oil spray to coat the air fryer basket

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TOPPINGS (optional):

Sour cream or Greek yogurt

Gravlax, fresh dill, and capers

Applesauce, apple slices, and cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a food processor, grate onions and transfer them to a medium-sized mixing bowl.
- 2. Grate potatoes and transfer to a colander. Use a kitchen towel, paper towels or cheesecloth to squeeze out moisture. [Note: Enclose the potato mixture in batches in the towels or cheese cloth and seriously squeeze out the liquid.]
- 3. Add the potatoes to the bowl of onions.
- 4. Add baking soda to prevent the onion-potato mixture from turning brown.
- 5. Add eggs, salt, pepper, baking powder, and flour; mix well.
- 6. Coat the air fryer basket with olive oil spray.
- 7. To shape the latkes, use a 1/4-cup measuring cup, and gently flatten each latke with the bottom of the measuring cup. Continue to scoop in 1/4-cup amounts into air fryer basket in a single layer.
- 8. Air fry at 375°F until the latkes are crispy and golden brown (about 8 to 10 minutes).

Serve with toppings.
