Shavuot (June 1-June 2, 2025)



Shavuot is the Hebrew word for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. Shavuot, like many other Jewish holidays, began as an ancient agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life.

History, Customs and Traditions: Shavuot, like several other Jewish holidays, began as an agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem – the "first fruits" of their harvest.

In modern times, Jews can no longer bring agricultural offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem, and thus there are no particular mitzvot, or commandments, associated with Shavuot. There are, however, several rituals that have become popular ways of celebrating the holiday, as we embrace the study of Torah and take inspiration from Jewish teachings.

Customarily, the Book of Ruth, part of the section of the Bible known as Writings, is read during services on Shavuot. Ruth was a young Moabite woman who married an Israelite man. When her husband died, she followed her mother-in-law, Naomi, back to Israel and adopted the Jewish faith and people as her own. To feed herself and Naomi, she gleaned in the field of Boaz, a rich man. Boaz is taken with her, and eventually they marry. Among their descendants is the famed King David.

The theme of Ruth's conversion to Judaism is central to this story. In Ruth 1:16–17, she states: Do not urge me to leave you, to turn back and not follow you. For wherever you go, I will go. Wherever you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die, and there will I be buried. Thus and more may God do to me if anything but death parts me from you.

Ruth is often considered to be the archetype of all who choose to convert to Judaism – accepting the Torah, just as Jews accepted the Torah at Mount Sinai – and this passage is generally understood as her conversion statement. The ceremony of confirmation – for high school students who have continued their studies and Jewish involvement beyond b'nei mitzvah – often is held on or near Shavuot. Just as the Jewish people accepted the Torah on Shavuot, so do confirmands reaffirm their commitment to the covenant and adult Jewish life.

The Foods We Eat on Shavuot: Many Jews prepare and eat dairy foods – often cheesecake or blintzes – on Shavuot as a reminder of the sweetness of Torah, and also as a reminder that the Torah calls the land of Israel a land "flowing with milk and honey" (Exodus 3:8). Often families gather together on the holiday to enjoy a meal that features such dishes.

Free of Charge, but You Must Register!

God gave us Torah at Mount Sinai, but we also receive it every day in each moment that we engage with our tradition.

On Sunday/Monday, June 1 and 2, we will celebrate the holiday of Shavuot. There is a tradition of late-night studying to accompany the holiday, called Tikkun Leil Shavuot. This is a wonderful study opportunity for members of our congregation, produced in partnership with URJ Small Congregations. On that evening, there will be about 25 learning blocks spread over different hours where you can join by Zoom. You may choose any class or classes that interest you throughout the programming. The menu of topics is diverse!

At 8:00 pm on June 1st, Rabbi Mills will be teaching a class on interfaith marriage throughout Jewish history. Ruth was not the first, nor the last. Moses married Zipporah, Ruth married Mahlon, and throughout our biblical Talmudic and early history, interfaith marriage did exist. It did not begin in the modern era. In this session, we will examine some of the cases of intermarriage in early Jewish history, their stories, and outcomes, and how the challenges were the same and how they differed from today's challenges.

Other Topics Include:

"A Blessing for All Seasons - Blessings are invitations to pause and capture moments of awe, gratitude, connection and wonder. We will go beyond the formulaic language we all know to explore the words of some traditional blessings and peel back the curtain on their spiritual messages.

"We All Stood (and Sang) at Sinai" - We'll look at how the folk music of the United States draws from values and lessons found in the Torah to create a new form of contemporary midrash.

"All the People Saw the Sounds" - In the revelation on Mount Sinai, the Torah says there was thunder and lightning and that, "All the people saw the sounds." We will look at how this odd phrase has been understood by linguists, neurologists, and Jewish mystics to try to answer the question: "What was witnessed at Sinai?

"Nevertheless, We Persisted" - A look at perseverance and grit in Jewish text and history

Jewish storytelling and how it was expressed in the history of musical theater.


CBJ On The Move

Recipe for Lemon Ricotta Pancakes (Perfect for Shavuot)

This recipe Makes 20 silver dollar size pancakes

INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon unsalted butter

1 cup whole milk ricotta

2 eggs

2 tablespoons light brown sugar

Zest of 1/2 medium lemon, finely minced

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons whole-wheat flour

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

Unsalted butter for frying

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place the 1 tablespoon of butter in a 11/2-quart glass bowl and microwave on high for 40 seconds or until the butter is melted.
- 2. Add the ricotta and eggs and mix well with a whisk to thoroughly combine.
- 3. Add the brown sugar, lemon zest, vanilla, nutmeg, salt, and the two flours and stir well.
- 4. Heat a griddle over medium-high heat and rub the end of a stick of butter all over the surface of the pan to coat it well.
- 5. Drop heaping tablespoons of batter onto the griddle and cook for 3 minutes or until the underside of the pancake is golden brown and the top is slightly dry.
- Gently flip the pancakes over (it might be easier to use 2 small spatulas to do this), and cook for another 2 minutes until the edges are barely crisp and both sides are golden brown.
- 7. Serve drizzled with additional melted butter, honey, or a dollop of sour cream, if desired.

Notes: These pancakes are as light as air and delicate, so turning is best achieved using two spatulas, one in each hand, to evenly brown both sides.

Whole-wheat flour contains more gluten than white flour, so less is needed in delicate foods to bind ingredients together.

A rasp-type grater is perfect for creating fine shards of lemon zest that will flavor the batter evenly without any bitter white pith from the inner peel.
